





MY SISTER AND OTHER LOVERS by Esther Freud


■ BITTER SWEET by Hattie Williams




ATMOSPHERE




HAVOC by Rebecca Wait


■ GETTING AWAY by Kate Sawyer

THE NIGHT LAGOON by Jo Morey



THE PHOENIX PENCIL COMPANY by Allison King




DON'T LET HIM IN by Lisa Jewell
